~~(a)~~(d) Custody of a juvenile may be transferred to a relative or other individual only after a full investigation of the placement is conducted by the Department of Human Services and submitted to the court in writing and the court determines that the placement is in the best interest of the juvenile.

~~(b)~~(e)1(A) The court shall enter orders transferring custody of juveniles in dependency-neglect cases only after determining that reasonable efforts have been made by the department to deliver family services designed to prevent the need for out-of-home placement and that the need for out-of-home placement exists.

(B) The juvenile's health and safety shall be the paramount concern for the court in determining whether or not the department could have

provided reasonable efforts to prevent the juvenile's removal.

(2) If the court finds that reasonable efforts to deliver family services could have been made with the juvenile safely remaining at home but were not made, the court may:

(A) Dismiss the petition;

(B) Order family services reasonably calculated to prevent the need for out-of-home placement; or

(C) Transfer custody of the juvenile despite the lack of reasonable efforts by the department to prevent the need for out-of-home placement, if such a transfer of custody is necessary:

(i) To protect the juvenile's health and safety; or

(ii) To prevent the juvenile from being removed from the jurisdiction of the court.

~~(e)~~(f) In a case of medical neglect involving a child receiving treatment through prayer alone in accordance with a religious method of healing in lieu of medical care, the adjudication order shall be limited to:

(1) Preventing or remedying serious harm to the child; or

(2) Preventing the withholding of medically indicated treatment from a child with a life-threatening condition."

**AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO HOUSE BILL NO. 2279**

Amend **HOUSE BILL NO. 2279** as engrossed, H3/31/03:

Page 7, delete lines 5 and 6 and substitute the following:

“(i) For a period of at least thirty (30) ninety (90) days and continues to be domiciled in Arkansas; and or”

AND

Page 8, line 24, delete the “under” and substitute “under either or both”

AND

Page 8, line 33, delete “under” and substitute “under either or both”

AND

Page 13, delete line 2 and substitute the following:

“health care facility, or health care provider, except as premiums paid on behalf of Trade Adjustment Assistance Eligible Persons or Qualified Trade Adjustment Assistance Eligible Persons in accordance with section 35 of the Internal Revenue Code, or on behalf of an otherwise”

AND

Page 17, delete lines 9 through 12 and substitute the following:

“SECTION 6. The Senate and House Interim Committees on Insurance and Commerce shall conduct a study of the Arkansas Comprehensive Health Insurance Pool for the purpose of determining alternative permanent funding sources for the deficits incurred by the Arkansas Comprehensive Health Insurance Pool in the future.”

SECTION 7. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the General Assembly that Arkansas residents who qualify for a federal tax credit for health insurance coverage because of loss of their jobs or other reasons should have access to coverage so that they can use the credit for themselves and qualifying members of their families; that making the residents eligible for enrollment in the Comprehensive Health Insurance Pool will allow them to obtain coverage and make use of their tax credits should other coverage not be available to them; and that the federal tax credits are now available. It is found and determined by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the benefits for members of the police and fire pension and relief funds are inadequate; that the benefits are supplemented by the Future Supplement Fund; that those supplemental benefits should be increased to continue to motivate the emergency service employees of our local governments; and that this act is immediately necessary to continue that motivation. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist and this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety shall become effective on:

(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;

(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor, the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the bill; or

(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.”

"SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 20, is amended to add an additional chapter to read as follows:

20-87-101. Title.

This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Arkansas Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Act".

20-87-102. Findings and purpose.

(a) The General Assembly finds that:

(1) Approximately one (1) in four (4) residents of Arkansas have no or

wholly inadequate prescription drug insurance coverage;

(2)(A) These uninsured residents pay excessive prices for prescription drugs, far higher prices than are paid by managed care organizations, insurance companies, and the federal government for the same medicines and dosages.

(B) In many cases, these excessive drug prices have the effect of denying people access to medically necessary care, thereby threatening their health and safety;

(3)(A) Many people require repeated doctor or medical clinic appointments, having gotten sicker because they cannot afford to take the prescriptions prescribed for them.

(B) Many people are admitted to or treated at hospitals each year because they cannot afford the drugs prescribed for them that could have prevented the need for hospitalization.

(C) Many others enter expensive institutional care settings because they cannot afford their necessary prescription drugs that could have supported them outside of an institution.

(D) In each of these circumstances, state medical assistance programs, including the Medicaid program, literally pay the price;

(4) A major reason uninsured residents pay so much for prescription drugs is that, unlike insured residents, they have no prescription benefits manager negotiating a fair price with the drug companies on their behalf; and

(5)(A) The state government is the only agent that, as a practical matter, can play an effective role as a market participant on behalf of all residents who are uninsured or underinsured.

(B) The state can and should act as a prescription benefit manager, negotiating voluntary drug rebates and using these funds to reimburse retail pharmacies for offering lower drug prices.

(b)(1) This chapter is enacted to create a program whereby the state acts as a participant in the prescription drug marketplace, negotiating voluntary rebates from drug companies and using the funds to make prescription drugs more affordable to Arkansas citizens.

(2) The program will improve public health and welfare, promote the economic strength of our society, and substantially benefit state health assistance programs, including the Medicaid program.

20-87-103. Definitions.

For purposes of this chapter:

(1) "Department" means the Department of Human Services;

(2) "Director" means the Director of the Department of Human Services, or

the director's designee:

(3) "Labeler" means an entity or person that receives prescription drugs from a manufacturer or wholesaler and repackages those drugs for later retail sale, and that has a labeler code from the United States Food and Drug Administration under 21 CFR 207.20 (1999);

(4) "Manufacturer" means a manufacturer of prescription drugs and includes a subsidiary or affiliate of a manufacturer; and

(5) "Retail Pharmacy" means a retail pharmacy or other business licensed to dispense prescription drugs in this state.

20-87-104. Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program.

(a) There is established the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program within the Department of Human Services to lower prescription drug prices for uninsured and underinsured residents of the state.

(b) A drug manufacturer or labeler that sells prescription drugs in the state may voluntarily elect to enter into a rebate agreement with the department.

(c) The Director of the Department of Human Services shall negotiate the terms of the rebate from a manufacturer or labeler, taking into consideration the rebate calculated under the Medicaid Rebate Program pursuant to 42 USC 1396r-8, the average wholesale price of prescription drugs, and any other available information on prescription drug prices and price discounts.

(d)(1) If a drug manufacturer or labeler elects not to agree to a rebate, the director may place the manufacturer's or labeler's products on the prior authorization list for the state Medicaid program, and take similar actions involving prior authorization or formularies for any other state-funded prescription drug program.

(2) The director shall promulgate rules creating clear procedures for the implementation of this section.

(3)(A) The names of manufacturers and labelers that do not enter into rebate agreements are public information and the department shall release the information to the public.

(B) The director shall also publicize to doctors, pharmacists, and other health professionals information about the relative cost of drugs produced by manufacturers and labelers that enter into rebate agreements compared to those who do not enter into rebate agreements.

(e) A retail pharmacy shall discount the price of prescription drugs sold to Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program participants.

(f) The department shall establish discounted prices for drugs covered by a rebate agreement and shall promote the use of efficacious and reduced-cost drugs, taking into consideration reduced prices for state and federally capped drug

programs, differential dispensing fees, administrative overhead, and incentive payments.

(g)(1) Beginning July 1, 2004, a retail pharmacy shall offer prescription drugs at or below the average wholesale price, minus six percent (6%), plus a dispensing fee designated by the director.

(2) These initial price levels shall be calculated by the director and the dispensing fee shall not be less than that provided under the state Medicaid program.

(3) The average wholesale price is the wholesale price charged on a specific commodity that is assigned by the drug manufacturer and is listed in a nationally recognized drug pricing file.

(h)(1) No later than January 1, 2005, a retail pharmacy shall offer prescription drugs at or below the initial price levels specified in subsection (g) of this section minus the amount of any rebate paid by the state to the retail pharmacy.

(2) These discounted price levels shall be calculated by the director.

(3) In determining the discounted price levels, the director shall consider an average of all rebates weighted by sales of drugs subject to these rebates over the most recent twelve-month period for which the information is available.

(i)(1) All residents of the state are eligible to participate in the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program.

(2) The department shall establish simplified procedures for issuing Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program enrollment cards to eligible residents.

(3) The department shall undertake outreach efforts to build public awareness of the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program and maximize enrollment by eligible residents.

(j) The department may not impose transaction charges on retail pharmacies that submit claims or receive payments under the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program.

(k) A retail pharmacy shall submit claims to the department to verify the amount charged to Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program participants.

(l) On a weekly or biweekly basis, the department shall reimburse a retail pharmacy for discounted prices provided to Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program participants and dispensing fees set by the director.

(m)(1) The department shall collect from the retail pharmacies utilization data necessary to calculate the amount of the rebate from the manufacturer or labeler.

(2) The department shall protect the confidentiality of all information subject to confidentiality protection under state or federal law, rule or regulation.

(n) The department shall promulgate rules to implement this chapter.

(o) The department may seek any waivers of federal law, rule or regulation necessary to implement this chapter.

20-87-105. Discrepancies in rebate amounts.

(a) Discrepancies in rebate amounts must be resolved using the process established in this section.

(b)(1) If there is a discrepancy in the manufacturer's or labeler's favor between the amount claimed by a pharmacy and the amount rebated by the manufacturer or labeler, the Department of Human Services, at the department's expense, may hire a mutually agreed upon independent auditor.

(2) If a discrepancy still exists following the audit, the manufacturer or labeler shall justify the reason for the discrepancy or make payment to the department for any additional amount due.

(c)(1) If there is a discrepancy against the interest of the manufacturer or labeler in the information provided by the department to the manufacturer or labeler regarding the manufacturer's or labeler's rebate, the manufacturer or labeler, at the manufacturer's or labeler's expense, may hire a mutually agreed upon independent auditor to verify the accuracy of the data supplied to the department.

(2) If a discrepancy still exists following the audit, the department shall justify the reason for the discrepancy or refund to the manufacturer any excess payment made by the manufacturer or labeler.

(d)(1) Following the procedures established in subsection (b) or (c), either the department or the manufacturer or labeler may request a hearing.

(2) Supporting documentation shall accompany the request for a hearing.

20-87-106. Annual summary report.

The Department of Human Services shall report the enrollment and financial status of the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program to the cochairs of the House and Senate Interim Committees on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor by the second week in July each year.

20-87-107. Coordination with other programs.

In implementing this chapter, the department shall coordinate with other governmental programs to increase efficiency and, if it is beneficial to another state program, combine drug pricing negotiations to maximize drug rebates for this and other programs, including the state Medicaid program.

SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 17-92-205, concerning rules and regulations for the Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy, is amended to add an additional subsection to read as follows:

(d)(1) The board shall adopt rules requiring disclosure by retail pharmacies to Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program participants of the amount of savings provided as a result of the Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program.

(2) The rules shall protect information that is proprietary in nature.

SECTION 3. Arkansas Code Title 19, Chapter 6, Subchapter 4 is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

19-6-487. Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Dedicated Fund.

(a) There is created on the books of the Treasurer of State, Auditor of State, and Chief Fiscal Officer of the State a special revenue fund to be known as the "Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Dedicated Fund".

(b)(1) All moneys collected under Title 20, Chapter 87 shall be deposited into the State Treasury to the credit of the fund as special revenues.

(2) The fund shall also consist of any other revenues as may be authorized by law.

(c) The fund shall be used by the Department of Human Services to reimburse retail pharmacies for discounted prices provided to Prescription Drug Fair Pricing Program participants, and reimburse the department for the costs of administering the program, including contracted services, computer costs, professional fees paid to retail pharmacies, and other reasonable program costs."

Delete everything following the enacting clause and substitute the following:

SECTION 1. (a) There is created a commission to be known as the "Advisory Commission on Math Excellence".

(b) The commission shall consist of six (6) members as follows:

(1) Two (2) members of the business community appointed by the Governor;

(2) Two (2) members appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, one (1) involved in teaching math in higher education and one (1) involved in vocational technical teaching; and

(3) Two (2) members appointed by the Speaker of the House, one (1) involved in high school math teaching, and one (1) a K-12 curriculum director.

(c) The Governor shall name one (1) of the commission's members to serve as chair of the commission.

(d) If a vacancy occurs in an appointed position for any reason, the vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

(e)(1) The commission shall meet upon call of the chair of the commission.

(2) Three (3) members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting business.

(3) A quorum is required for action of the commission.

(4) The commission will meet at times that will not conflict with classroom teaching.

(f)(1) The commission shall review various curricula for math education of students in grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) and adopt standards for grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) math for the State of Arkansas subject to approval of the Department of Education and the State Board of Education. The curriculum frameworks for all math courses in grades K-12 shall be aligned with the new math standards. The State Department of Education will develop curriculum frameworks for all math courses and each school shall develop a curriculum that is aligned with the frameworks. Current frameworks shall be refined and revised to be more grade level specific. Teachers of math will be utilized in the refinement process.

(2) The commission shall advise the Department of Education and the State Board of Education on methods to improve the consistency and continuity of math education in the State of Arkansas to the actual instruction in classrooms with state standards and curriculum frameworks based on adopted standards.

(3) Each year the school will determine if each student is at grade level at the end of the school year. This determination will be based on standardized tests, end of course exams, and grades. If a student is below grade level, the school will provide summer instruction in math for the purpose of remediation. After summer instruction if the student is still below grade level remediation will take place during the next academic year until grade level is reached. Appropriate professional development will be provided math teachers to assist them in working with students. Professional development will be provided for all math teachers in each school when math scores on state tests are below the state average.

(4) After completion of grade eight (8), each student will be evaluated for placement in the appropriate math track. The commission will recommend the appropriate structure for these tracks. If a student does not meet standards at the end of grade twelve (12), one (1) additional year of study will be required to bring the student to an acceptable level of performance in math.

(5) The Department of Education and schools will work together to develop research which will assist in improving the teaching of math in Arkansas. Institutions of higher education will be involved in the research process when it is appropriate.

(g) If the Department of Education fails to adopt the standards recommended by the commission, the Department of Education shall state in writing all the department's and the board's objection to the standards and reasons for not adopting the standards.

(h) The Department of Education shall provide office space and staff assistance to the Advisory Commission on Math Excellence.

(i)(1) The members of the Advisory Commission on Math Excellence shall serve without pay.

(2) All members of the commission may receive expense reimbursement in accordance with Arkansas Code § 25-16-902, to be paid by the Department of Education.

SECTION 1. Definitions.

As used in this act:

(1) "Large carnivore" means any live individual of those species of animals that are inherently dangerous to humans, including, but are not limited to:

(A) Tigers;

(B) Lions;

(C) Cougars;

(D) Leopards;

(E) Ocelots;

(F) Servals;

(G) All bears;

(H) Bobcats;

(I) Lynx;

(J) Cheetahs;

(K) Jaguars; and

(L) Any hybrids of the animals listed in subdivisions (1)(A) through (K) of this section;

(2) "Possessor" means a person who owns, keeps, or has custody or control of a large carnivore; and

(3) "Wildlife sanctuary" means:

(A) A nonprofit organization under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code that operates a place of refuge where abused, neglected, unwanted, impounded, abandoned, orphaned or displaced large carnivores are provided care for their lifetime; and

(B) Does not mean a place that:

(i) Conducts any activity that is not inherent to the animal's nature;

(ii) Uses the animal for any type of entertainment;

(iii) Sells, trades, or barter the animal or the animal's body parts; or

(4) Breeds the animal for purposes of sale.

SECTION 2. Prohibited acts.

(a) Except as permitted under this act, it is unlawful for a person to:

(1) Own or possess a large carnivore;

(2) Breed a large carnivore; or

(3) Transfer ownership or possession of, or receive a transfer of ownership or possession of a large carnivore, with or without remuneration.

(b) Except under this act, it is prohibited for a possessor in control of any property, residence, or business premises to knowingly permit any other person to be in possession of a large carnivore upon the property, residence, or premises.

### SECTION 3. Exemptions.

This act does not apply to:

(1) Institutions accredited by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association;

(2) Registered nonprofit humane societies;

(3) Animal control officers or law enforcement officers acting under the authority of this act;

(4) Veterinary hospitals or clinics;

(5) Wildlife sanctuaries;

(6) Employees of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission in the performance of their duties; or

(7) Those persons holding a valid Arkansas Game and Fish Commission scientific collection permit applicable to a large carnivore.

### SECTION 4. Permit for personal possession.

(a) A person may possess a large carnivore only if:

(1) The person was in possession of the large carnivore and was the legal possessor of the large carnivore on or before the effective date of this act; and

(2) The person applies for and is granted a permit for personal possession for each large carnivore in the person's possession not more than ninety (90) days after the effective date of this act.

(b)(1) A person under subsection (a) of this section shall annually obtain a permit for personal possession.

(2) After the effective date of this act, a new large carnivore shall not be brought into possession under the authority of a permit for personal possession.

(c)(1) An applicant shall file an application to receive a permit for personal possession with the Department of Health on forms provided by the department.

(2) The application shall include:

(A) The name, address, and telephone number of the applicant;

(B) A description of each large carnivore, including the scientific classification, name, sex, age, color, weight, and distinguishing marks or coloration that would aid in the identification of the animal;

(C) A photograph of the large carnivore;

(D) The location where the animal is kept; and

(E) The name, address, and telephone number of the person from whom the applicant obtained the large carnivore, if known.

(3) The application shall be signed by the veterinarian who is expected to provide veterinary care to the large carnivore and shall have the veterinarian's name, address, telephone number.

(d) The Department of Health shall not grant a permit unless:

(1) An annual permit fee of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for each animal accompanies the application;

(2) The applicant is eighteen (18) years of age or older;

(3) The applicant has not been found guilty or nolo contendere, or pled guilty to any animal cruelty violations in the past ten (10) years or to a felony for possession, sale, or use of illegal narcotics in the past ten (10) years;

(4) The facility and the conditions in which the large carnivore is kept comply with this act; and

(5) The applicant has obtained the liability insurance coverage for the large carnivore as required under this act.

(e)(1) The Department of Health shall keep records of who is issued a valid permit for personal possession of a large carnivore.

(2) A permit holder must notify the state of any changes of the permit holder's information, including the death of the large carnivore.

(f)(1) In addition to the other requirements for issuance of a permit for personal possession, the large carnivore shall be spayed or neutered before a permit is issued to the possessor unless a veterinarian confirms that spaying and neutering would endanger the animal.

(2) A record of the large carnivore being spayed or neutered by a veterinarian is to be kept on file.

(g) All fees levied and collected for permits of personal possession under this section are declared to be special revenues and shall be deposited in the State Treasury, there to be credited to the Public Health Fund.

#### SECTION 5. Caging requirements.

(a)(1) The possessor of a large carnivore is required to maintain the animal in a cage that meets the requirements recommended by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association for each species of large carnivore.

(2) Failure to provide the caging required by this section will result in the cancellation of the permit for personal possession.

(b) Deviations from these requirements may be approved by the Director of

the Department of Health upon showing of good cause.

SECTION 6. Insurance - Signs - and Notification.

(a)(1) A possessor of a large carnivore shall maintain liability insurance coverage in an amount of not less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for each occurrence for liability damages for destruction of or damage to property and for death or bodily injury to a person caused by the large carnivore.

(2) The possessor of a large carnivore shall provide a copy of the policy for liability insurance to the Department of Health on an annual basis to obtain or renew a permit.

(b)(1) The possessor of a large carnivore shall post and display a sign at each possible entrance onto the premises where a large carnivore is kept.

(2) The sign shall be clearly legible, and easily readable by the public.

(3) The sign shall warn that there is a large carnivore on the premises.

SECTION 7. Inspection.

The possessor of a large carnivore shall allow an official of the Department of Health, an animal control officer, or a law enforcement officer of the municipality or county where the animal is kept to enter the premises to ensure compliance with this act.

SECTION 8. Public contact - Warnings of escape.

(a) The possessor shall not bring a large carnivore to any commercial or retail establishment unless the possessor is bringing the animal to the veterinarian clinic.

(b)(1) If a large carnivore escapes or is released, the possessor of the large carnivore shall immediately contact the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission and law enforcement officials of the city or county where the possessor resides to report the escape or release.

(2) The possessor is liable for all expenses associated with efforts to recapture the animal.

SECTION 9. Confiscation.

(a) A large carnivore may be immediately confiscated by the Department of Health if:

(1) The possessor does not have a permit for personal possession;

(2) The possessor does not secure the liability insurance coverage required under this act;

(3) Conditions under which the large carnivore is kept are directly or indirectly dangerous to human health and safety; or

(4) The caging requirements of Section 5 are not met.

(b)(1) If a large carnivore is confiscated, the possessor shall be liable for the

costs of placement and care for the large carnivore from the time of confiscation until the time the animal has been relocated to an alternative facility.

(2) The Department of Health shall seek to place the confiscated animal with a wildlife sanctuary, humane society, or an institution accredited by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association.

SECTION 10. Penalties.

A person who is in violation of the prohibitions of Section 2. of this act is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.

SECTION 11. Rules and regulations.

The State Board of Health is authorized to adopt rules and regulations to implement and enforce this act.”
