Upon motion of Representative Davenport, **HOUSE BILL NO. 2406** was placed back on second reading for the purpose of amendment.

**AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO HOUSE BILL NO. 2406**

Amend **HOUSE BILL NO. 2406** as originally introduced:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and substitute the following:

"SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 4, Chapter 105 is amended to add an additional subchapter to read as follows:

4-105-301. Title.

This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Arkansas Equipment Quality Assurance Act".

4-105-302. Definitions.

As used in this subchapter:

(1) "Calendar day" means any day of the week other than a legal holiday;

(2)(A) "Collateral charges" means those additional charges to a consumer wholly incurred as a result of the acquisition of the equipment.

(B) "Collateral charges" includes manufacturer-installed or agent-installed items, earned finance charges, sales taxes, title charges, and charges for extended warranties provided by a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer;

(3) "Condition" means a general problem that may be attributable to a defect in more than one (1) part;

(4) "Consumer" means a purchaser or lessee, other than for the purposes of lease or resale, of new or previously used equipment or any other person entitled to enforce the obligations of the warranty during the duration of the quality assurance period;

(5) "Equipment" means any self-propelled farm equipment, construction equipment, or industrial equipment that has one hundred five horsepower (105 hp) or less and is primarily designed for farm, construction, or industrial use;

(6) "Incidental charges" means those reasonable costs incurred by a consumer, including hauling charges and the costs of obtaining alternative equipment, which are directly caused by the nonconformity or nonconformities that are the subject of the claim but shall not include loss of use, loss of income, or personal injury claims;

(7) "Lease price" means the aggregate of:

(A) A lessor's actual purchase costs;

(B) Collateral charges, if applicable;

(C) Any fee paid to another person to obtain the lease;

(D) Any insurance or other costs expended by the lessor for the benefit of the lease;

(E) An amount equal to state and local sales taxes, not otherwise included as collateral charges, paid by the lessor when the equipment was initially purchased; and

(F) An amount equal to five percent (5%) of the lessor's actual purchase price;

(8) "Lessee" means a consumer who leases equipment for one (1) year or more under a written lease agreement that provides that the lessee is responsible for repairs to the equipment;

(9) "Lessee cost" means the aggregate deposit and rental payments previously paid to a lessor for the equipment;

(10) "Lessor" means a person that owns the equipment leased to a lessee under the written lease agreement or that holds the lessor's rights under the written lease agreement;

(11) "Manufacturer" means:

(A) A person that is engaged in the business of constructing or assembling new equipment or installing on previously assembled equipment special bodies or equipment that when installed form an integral part of the equipment; or

(B) In the case of equipment not manufactured in the United States, a person that is engaged in the business of importing new equipment into the United States for the purpose of selling or distributing new equipment to new equipment dealers;

(12) "Nonconformity" means any specific or generic defect or condition or any concurrent combination of defects or conditions that:

(A) Substantially impairs the use, market value, or safety of equipment; or

(B) Renders the equipment nonconforming to the terms of an applicable manufacturer's express warranty or implied warranty of merchantability;

(13) "Person" means any natural person, partnership, firm, corporation, association, joint venture, trust, or other legal entity;

(14) "Purchase price" means the cash price paid for the equipment appearing in the sales agreement or contract, including any net allowance for trade-in equipment;

(15) "Quality assurance period" means a period of time that:

(A) Begins:

(i) On the date of original delivery of an equipment; or  
(ii) In the case of replacement equipment provided by a manufacturer to a consumer under this subchapter, on the date of delivery of the replacement equipment to the consumer; and

(B) Ends twenty-four (24) months after the date of the original delivery of the equipment to a consumer or the first one thousand (1,000) hours of operation attributable to the consumer, whichever is later;

(16) "Replacement equipment" means equipment that is identical or reasonably equivalent to the equipment to be replaced, as the equipment replaced existed at the time of the original acquisition; and

(17) "Warranty" means any written warranty issued by a manufacturer, or any affirmation of fact or promise made by the manufacturer, excluding statements made by a dealer, in connection with the sale or lease of equipment to a consumer that relates to the nature of the material or workmanship and affirms or promises that such material or workmanship is free of defects or will meet a specified level of performance.

4-105-303. Disclosure by manufacturer, agent, or dealer.

(a)(1)(A) At the time of the purchase or lease of the equipment, a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer shall provide to a consumer a written statement that explains the consumer's rights and obligations under this subchapter.

(B) The manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer shall obtain the consumer's signed acknowledgement of the receipt of the written statement explaining the consumer's rights and obligations under this subchapter.

(C) The manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer shall maintain copies of the consumer's signed acknowledgement for a period of not less than five (5) years.

(2) The written statement provided under subdivision (a)(1)(A) of this section shall:

(A) Be prepared by the Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Attorney General; and

(B) Include the telephone number of the division where the consumer can call for information regarding his or her rights and obligations under this subchapter.

(b)(1) In the warranty or owner's manual, a manufacturer shall clearly and conspicuously disclose to a consumer that written notice of a nonconformity is required before the consumer may be eligible for a refund or replacement of the equipment.

(2) At the time of acquisition of the equipment, the manufacturer shall provide the consumer with conspicuous notice of the address and telephone number for its zone, district, or regional office for this state where the consumer must send notification of any nonconformity.

(c)(1) If a manufacturer makes the disclosure required by subsections (a) and (b) of this section, a consumer shall utilize the informal dispute settlement proceeding under § 4-105-313 before bringing any legal action to enforce the consumer's rights under this subchapter.

(2) If the manufacturer does not make the disclosure required by subsections (a) and (b) of this section, the consumer is not required to use the informal dispute settlement procedure under § 4-105-313 before using any other remedy to enforce his or her rights under this subchapter.

(d) For each failure of a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer to provide a consumer the disclosures statement required under this section and for each failure to retain a signed acknowledgement form as required by this section, the manufacturer shall be liable to the state for a civil penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

4-105-304. Required warranty repairs.

If equipment does not conform to the warranty and the consumer reports the nonconformity to a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer during the quality assurance period, the manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer shall make the necessary repairs to correct the nonconformity.

4-105-305. Required repairs – Consumer's options.

(a)(1) After three (3) attempts have been made to repair the same nonconformity that substantially impairs the equipment, or after one (1) attempt to repair a nonconformity that is likely to cause death or serious bodily injury, a consumer shall give written notification by certified or registered mail to a manufacturer of the need to repair the nonconformity in order to allow the manufacturer a final attempt to cure the nonconformity.

(2)(A) Within ten (10) days after receipt of the notification, the manufacturer shall notify and provide the consumer with the opportunity to have the equipment repaired at a reasonably accessible repair facility.

(B) Within ten (10) days after delivery of the equipment to the designated repair facility by the consumer, the manufacturer shall conform the equipment to the warranty.

(3) If the manufacturer fails to notify and provide the consumer with the opportunity to have the equipment repaired at a reasonably accessible repair facility or fails to perform the repairs within the time periods required under this section:

(A) The consumer is not required to give the manufacturer a final attempt to cure the nonconformity under subdivision (a)(1) of this section; and

(B) A nonrebuttable presumption of a reasonable number of attempts to repair exists.

(b)(1)(A) If the manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer fails to conform the equipment to the warranty by repairing or correcting one (1) or more nonconformities after a reasonable number of attempts, the manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer shall:

(i) At the time of its receipt of payment of a reasonable offset for use by a consumer, replace the equipment with replacement equipment acceptable to the consumer; or

(ii) Repurchase the equipment from the consumer or lessor and refund to the consumer or the lessor the full purchase price or lease price less a reasonable offset for:

(a) Its use; and

(b) Any physical damage sustained to the equipment while under the ownership of the consumer or the lessor.

(B) A replacement or refund under subdivision (b)(1)(A) of this section shall include payment of all collateral and reasonably incurred incidental charges.

(2)(A) The consumer shall have an unconditional right to choose either a refund or a replacement.

(B) At the time of the refund or replacement, the consumer, lienholder, or lessor shall furnish to the manufacturer clear evidence of ownership and possession of the equipment.

(3) The amount of any reasonable offset for use by the consumer shall be determined by multiplying the actual price of the equipment paid or payable by the consumer, including any charges for transportation and manufacturer-installed or agent-installed options, by a fraction having:

(A) As its denominator, six thousand (6,000); and

(B) As its numerator, the number of hours the equipment was used before it was delivered to the manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer for correction of the problem that gave rise to the nonconformity.

4-105-306. Refunds.

(a)(1) Refunds shall be made to a consumer and lienholder of record, if any, as their interests may appear.

(2) If applicable, refunds shall be made to a lessor and lessee as follows:

(A) The lessee shall receive the lessee's cost less a reasonable offset for the equipment's use; and

(B) The lessor shall receive the lease price less the aggregate deposit and rental payments previously paid to the lessor for the leased equipment.

(b) If a manufacturer makes a refund to a lessor or lessee under this subchapter:

(1) The consumer's lease agreement with the lessor shall terminate upon payment of the refund; and

(2) No penalty for early termination shall be assessed.

(c) If the replaced equipment was financed by a manufacturer, its agent or an authorized dealer, the manufacturer, the agent or the authorized dealer may not require a consumer to enter into any refinancing agreement concerning replacement equipment that would create any additional financial obligations upon the consumer that would be greater than the financial obligations under the consumer's original financing agreement.

4-105-307. Reimbursement of hauling and rental costs.

Whenever equipment is replaced or refunded under this subchapter, the manufacturer shall reimburse a consumer for necessary hauling and rental costs actually incurred as a direct result of the nonconformity.

4-105-308. Option to retain use of equipment.

A consumer has the option of retaining the use of any equipment returned under this subchapter until the consumer has been given:

(1) A full refund; or

(2) Replacement equipment of comparable value.

4-105-309. Presumption of failure to correct – Suspension during certain periods.

(a) A rebuttable presumption of a failure to correct a nonconformity arises if:

(1) The nonconformity has been subject to repair as provided in § 4-105-305 and the nonconformity continues to exist;

(2) The equipment is out of service for a cumulative total of thirty (30) calendar days for repair of a nonconformity; or

(3) There have been five (5) or more attempts to repair a nonconformity.

(b)(1) The thirty-day time period in subdivision (a)(2) of this section is suspended by the period of time during which repair services are unavailable as a direct result of war, invasion, strike, fire, flood, or natural disaster.

(2) During a suspension under subdivision (b)(1) of this section, a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer shall provide or make provision for a consumer to have the free use of substitute equipment.

(c) A manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer has the burden of proof to show that the reason for an extension under subsection (b) of this section was the direct cause for its failure to cure any nonconformity during a suspension under subdivision (b)(1) of this section.

4-105-310. Diagnosis or repair - Documentation.

(a) A manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer may not refuse to diagnose or repair any equipment for the purpose of avoiding liability under this subchapter.

(b)(1)(A) A manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer shall provide a consumer with a written repair order each time the consumer's equipment is brought in for examination or repair.

(B)(i) The written repair order shall include a reference to each defect, nonconformity, or other complaint brought to the attention of the manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer by the consumer.

(ii) Each presentation of the equipment by the consumer for a reasonable opportunity to repair shall be a repair attempt for those defects, nonconformities, or other complaints noted in the written repair order.

(2) The repair order shall indicate all work performed on the equipment, including any examination of the equipment, parts, and labor.

4-105-311. Resale of returned nonconforming equipment.

(a) If equipment has been replaced or repurchased by a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer as the result of a court judgment, an arbitration award, or any voluntary agreement between the manufacturer, its agent, or authorized dealer and a consumer, the equipment may not be resold in this state unless:

(1)(A) The manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer provides the same express warranty that was provided to the original purchaser.

(B) The term of the warranty shall be for five hundred (500) hours or twelve (12) months after the date of resale, whichever is the earliest; and

(2) The manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer provides a written disclosure, signed by the consumer, indicating that the equipment was returned because of a nonconformity that was not cured within a reasonable time under Arkansas law.

(b) The written disclosure required by this section applies to the first resale to a consumer of the equipment in this state by a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer.

4-105-312. Affirmative defenses.

The following affirmative defenses are available as a defense to any claim under this subchapter:

(1) The nonconformity, defect, or condition does not substantially impair the use, value, or safety of the equipment;

(2) The nonconformity, defect, or condition is the result of an accident, abuse, neglect, or unauthorized modification or alteration of the equipment by someone other than a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer;

(3) The claim by a consumer was not filed in good faith; or

(4) Any other defense allowed by law.

4-105-313. Informal dispute settlement proceeding.

(a)(1) A manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer doing business in this state, entering into franchise agreements for the sale of its equipment in this state, or offering express warranties on its equipment sold or distributed for sale in this state shall operate or participate in an informal dispute settlement proceeding in this state that complies with the requirements of this section.

(2) The provisions of § 4-105-306 concerning refunds or replacement do not apply to a consumer who does not use the informal dispute settlement proceeding before commencing a civil action unless the manufacturer:

(A) Allows the consumer to commence an action without first using the informal dispute settlement proceeding; or

(B) Fails to make a disclosure required by § 4-105-303.

(3)(A) The manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer shall provide the consumer with adequate written notice of the existence of the informal dispute settlement proceeding.

(B) Adequate written notice under subdivision (a)(3)(A) of this section includes the inclusion of the informal dispute settlement proceeding notice in the terms of the written warranty for the equipment.

(b) The informal dispute settlement proceeding shall meet the following criteria:

(1)(A) The informal dispute settlement proceeding must comply with the minimum requirements of the Federal Trade Commission for informal dispute settlement proceedings as set forth in 16 C.F.R. § 703.1 et seq., as it existed on January 1, 2007.

(B) The provisions of this subchapter shall govern if there is any provision of 16 C.F.R. § 703.1 et seq., as it existed on January 1, 2007, that conflicts with this subchapter;

(2)(A) The informal dispute settlement proceeding shall set a reasonable time after a consumer's acceptance of the decision when a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer must comply with the decision.

(B) The time for compliance with the decision may not exceed thirty (30) days;

(3)(A) Documents shall only be received in an informal dispute settlement proceeding if:

(i) That document was provided to each of the parties to the dispute either before or at the commencement of the informal dispute settlement proceeding; and

(ii) Each party is afforded an opportunity to comment either in writing or orally on the document.

(B) If the consumer is present during the informal dispute settlement proceeding, he or she may request a postponement of the informal dispute settlement proceeding that will allow sufficient time to review any document that had not been provided before the informal dispute settlement proceeding began;

(4)(A) Each party shall be allowed to appear and make an oral presentation during the informal dispute settlement proceeding unless:

(i) The consumer agrees to submit the dispute for decision on the basis of documentation or by telephone; or

(ii) A party fails to appear for an oral presentation after being given reasonable written notice of the proceeding.

(B) If the consumer agrees to submit the dispute for decision on the basis of documents alone, then the manufacturer, its agent, or the authorized dealer may not participate in the discussion of the dispute;

(5)(A) The consumer shall be given an adequate opportunity to contest the manufacturer's assertion that a nonconformity falls within intended specifications for the equipment.

(B) An adequate opportunity includes having the basis of the manufacturer's claim appraised by a technical expert selected and paid for by the consumer before the commencement of the informal dispute settlement proceeding;

(6) The consumer may not be charged a fee to participate in an informal dispute settlement proceeding; and

(7) Any party to the dispute has the right to be represented by an attorney in an informal dispute settlement proceeding.

4-315-314. Enforcement - Exclusivity - Costs and expenses.

(a) A consumer may bring a civil action to enforce this subchapter in a court of competent jurisdiction.

(b) This subchapter does not limit the rights and remedies that are otherwise available to a consumer under any applicable provisions of law.

(c) A consumer who prevails in any legal proceeding under this subchapter is entitled to recover as part of the judgment a sum equal to the aggregate amount of the consumer's costs and expenses, including attorney's fees based upon actual time expended by an attorney, determined by the court to have been reasonably incurred by the consumer for or in connection with the commencement and prosecution of the action.

4-105-315. Time limitation for commencement of action.

(a) An action brought under this subchapter must be commenced within two (2) years following the date a consumer first reports the nonconformity to a manufacturer, its agent, or an authorized dealer.

(b) If the consumer initiates the informal dispute settlement procedure under § 4-105-313, the two-year limitation in subsection (a) of this section shall begin to run on that date.

SECTION 36. Arkansas Code 19-5-403 is amended to read as follows:

19-5-403. Allocations for fiscal year 2008-09 and thereafter.

Commencing with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008, and each fiscal year thereafter, the Treasurer of State shall transfer all remaining general revenues available for distribution on the last day of business in July 2008, and on the last day of business in each calendar month thereafter during the fiscal year to the various funds and fund accounts participating in general revenues in the proportions of the maximum allocation as the individual allocation to the fund or fund account bears to the total of the maximum allocation as provided in § 19-5-404(a), (a-1) and (b).

SECTION 37. Arkansas Code 19-5-404 is amended to read as follows:

19-5-404. Maximum allocations of revenues for fiscal year 2008-09 and thereafter.

(a) The Treasurer of State shall first make monthly allocations in the proportions set out in this subsection to the funds and fund accounts listed below until there has been transferred a total of four billion one hundred seventy million three hundred one thousand two hundred eighty-seven dollars (\$4,170,301,287) or so much thereof as may become available; provided that the Treasurer of State shall make such

monthly allocations in accordance with each fund or fund account's proportionate part of the total of all such allocations set forth in this subsection:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH GENERAL  
ASSEMBLY OF THE  
STATE OF ARKANSAS AND BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, A  
MAJORITY OF ALL  
MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE AGREEING THERETO:

That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of  
the State of Arkansas, and upon being submitted to the electors of the state for  
approval or rejection at the next general election for Senators and

Representatives, if a majority of the electors voting thereon at the election adopt the amendment, the amendment shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Arkansas, to wit:

§ 1. Qualifications of electors - Equal suffrage - Poll tax.

Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years, who has resided in the State twelve months, in the county six months, and in the precinct, town or ward one month, next preceding any election at which they may propose to vote, except such persons as may for the commission of some felony be deprived of the right to vote by law passed by the General Assembly, and who shall exhibit a poll tax receipt or other evidence that they have paid their poll tax at the time of collecting taxes next preceding such election, shall be allowed to vote at any election in the State of Arkansas, provided, that persons who make satisfactory proof that they have attained the age of twenty-one years since the time of assessing taxes next preceding said election and possess the other necessary qualifications, shall be permitted to vote; and, provided, further, that the said tax receipt shall be so marked by dated stamp or written endorsement by the judges of election to whom it may be first presented as to prevent the holder thereof from voting more than once at any election. It is declared to be the purpose of this amendment to deny the right of suffrage to aliens and it is declared to be the purpose of this amendment to confer suffrage equally upon both men and women, without regard to sex; provided, that women shall not be compelled to serve on juries. [As amended by Const. Amend. 8.] Except as otherwise provided by this Constitution, any person may vote in an election in this state who is:

- (1) A citizen of the United States;
- (2) A resident of the State of Arkansas;
- (3) At least eighteen (18) years of age; and
- (4) Lawfully registered to vote in the election.

SECTION 2. Section 2 of Article 3 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to read as follows:

§ 2. Right of suffrage.

Elections shall be free and equal. No power, civil or military, shall ever interfere to prevent the free exercise of the right of suffrage; nor shall any law be enacted, whereby the right to vote at any election shall be made to depend upon any previous registration of the elector's name; or whereby such right shall be impaired or forfeited, except for the commission of a felony at common law, upon lawful conviction thereof.

SECTION 3. Section 5 of Article 3 is repealed.

5. Idiots and insane persons

No idiot or insane person shall be entitled to the privileges of an elector

SECTION 4. Section 8 of Article 3 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to read as follows:

8. Time of holding elections.

The general elections shall be held biennially, on the first Monday of September; but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different time the days and at times fixed by the General Assembly.

SECTION 5. Section 10 of Article 3 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to read as follows:

10. Election officers.

No person shall be qualified to serve as an election officer who shall hold, at the time of the election, any office, appointment, or employment in or under the government of the United States, or of this State, or in any city or county or any municipal board, commission or trust in any city, save only the justices of the peace, and aldermen, notaries public and persons in the militia service of the State. Nor shall any election officer be eligible to any civil office to be filled at an election at which he shall serve save only to such subordinate municipal or local offices, below the grade of city or county officers, as shall be designated by general law The General Assembly shall determine the qualifications of an election officer.

SECTION 7. Arkansas Code § 15-21-503 is amended to read as follows:

15-21-503. Creation - Board.

(a) The Arkansas State Land Information Board is created.

(b)(1)(A) The board shall be composed of twelve (12) voting members appointed by the Governor for terms of four (4) years.

(B) At the time of appointment or reappointment, the appointing authority shall adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of members of the board are staggered so that, insofar as possible, an equal number of members shall rotate each year.

(2) The board shall be composed of the following members or their designees:

(A) Three (3) state entity representatives;

(B) Three (3) city, county, and local government representatives;

(C) Three (3) private sector representatives; and

(D) Three (3) representatives of institutions of higher education.

(3) All members of the board shall have knowledge of the use and usefulness of digital land and geographic information in the management of government and a general awareness of the role of mapping as related to that management.

(4) No person shall serve as a member of the board for more than two (2) full consecutive terms.

(5) Upon the death, disability, resignation, removal, or refusal to serve of any member, the Governor shall appoint a qualified person to complete board membership.

(c)(1)(A) A chair and a vice chair shall be elected by the board membership to oversee all board and committee meetings.

(B) Members of the board must elect a chair and vice chair every year.

(2)(A) The board will work with the State Geographic Information Coordinator assigned by the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ Director of the Department of Information Systems with approval from the board.

(B) The State Geographic Information Coordinator will:

(i) Assist the board in developing a comprehensive plan and evaluation procedures on how the state should implement tactical and strategic geographic information systems and land information systems planning;

(ii) Implement informational and educational programs;

and

(iii) Coordinate intrastate geographic information systems and land information systems efforts.

(C) The State Geographic Information Coordinator shall report directly to the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ Director of the Department of Information Systems.

(d)(1) The State Geographic Information Coordinator shall administer daily operations of the Arkansas Geographic Information Office with direction from the board.

(2) This may include liaison between the board and the Governor, the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ Director of the Department of Information Systems, and public or private sector entities involved in spatial data and land records modernization, project management in the preparation of the strategic planning documents related to spatial data and land records modernization, developing policy and procedures for land records modernization, and developing policy and procedures for the activities of the board.

(3) Additional requirements are the implementation of educational programs, coordinating vendor exhibits, and facilitating technical assistance and consulting.

(e) The board may conduct meetings at such places and such times as it may deem necessary or convenient to enable it to exercise fully and effectively its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish its objectives and purposes.

(f) Members of the board shall receive no compensation for their services.

(g) The board will be provided administrative support through the ~~Office of Information Technology~~ Arkansas Geographic Information Office.

(h) The funds necessary to carry out the provisions of this subchapter shall come from the Geographic Information Systems Fund.

(i) The board shall seek the review and advice of the Joint Committee on Advanced Communications and Information Technology prior to issuing guidelines, proposed legislation, and strategic plans.

SECTION 8. Arkansas Code 19-5-1112(b), concerning the Geographic Information Systems Fund, is amended to read as follows:

(b)(1)(A) The ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ Director of the Department of Information Systems shall manage the fund, and the Governor shall oversee the expenditures from the fund.

(B) The Arkansas State Land Information Board shall establish standards and methodologies for evaluating the funding of enterprise-level geographic information systems projects.

(2)(A) The ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ Director of the Department of Information Systems, with advice from the board, shall evaluate, prioritize, and approve proposals for geographic information systems projects.

(B) Such proposals and requests for funding shall demonstrate any or all of the following:

- (i) Improvement in the quality of life for Arkansans;
- (ii) Elimination of redundant systems;
- (iii) Improved service for Arkansas citizens;
- (iv) Enhanced economic development opportunities in Arkansas;
- (v) Implementation of electronic government twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week;
- (vi) Substantial benefit to more than one (1) agency through lower operating costs; and
- (vii) Continued development of the Arkansas Spatial Data Infrastructure.

SECTION 9. Arkansas Code 19-11-1101(c), concerning state agency contracts, is amended to read as follows:

(c)(1) All contracts authorized by this subchapter shall be entered into pursuant to the requirements of the Arkansas Procurement Law, § 19-11-201 et seq., and amendments thereto.

(2) Prior to execution of the contract, the following process shall be followed:

(A) The requesting agency shall request approval from the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State to prepare a request for proposal for a project authorized under this subchapter;

(B) The request shall include the general nature of the project, the anticipated revenues that will be enhanced, and the forecasted revenues for the current biennium;

(C) Upon approval of the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State, the requesting agency shall prepare a request to the Department of Finance and Administration for approval to prepare a request for proposal for a technology project authorized under this subchapter;

(D) The request must include the revenue source or sources that will be increased as a result of the project and the projected revenues for the anticipated life of the project;

(E) The requesting agency shall prepare a request for proposal, with advice and consultation from ~~the office of the Executive Chief Information~~

Officer and the department, for the purchase of technology systems on the basis of a portion of the increase in the agency's revenues produced by the technology system; and

(F)(i) The request for proposal may provide that the agency and the vendor may negotiate an amount or baseline upon which the increase in taxes or fees is measured.

(ii) Any contract other than a fixed fee contract shall include a factor in the baseline calculation to account for an increase in taxes or fees due solely to economic factors and not to the use of the technology.

(3) The agency procurement official or procurement agent and the vendor shall negotiate the contract, with the oversight of ~~the office of the Executive Chief Information Officer~~ and the department to assist in negotiating an advantageous contract.

(4)(A) The agency director shall submit the proposed contract and a request for new appropriation to the Governor or his or her designee.

(B) The accompanying information will include the methodology used to calculate the baseline amount proposed by the agency and other justifications and information that detail the program and the expected benefits of the agreement.

(C) The Governor or his or her designee shall study the request and determine whether the appropriation requested and the terms of the proposed contract are in strict compliance with this subchapter.

(D)(i) The Governor may approve or modify the request for new appropriation and the proposed contract.

(ii) Any modification of the proposed contract shall be submitted to the vendor for approval.

(5)(A) Upon approval of the shared benefit agreement and new appropriation request, the Governor shall seek the advice and recommendation of the Legislative Council.

(B) Upon review of the Legislative Council, the Governor shall forward a copy of his or her approvals to the agency director and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State.

SECTION 10. Arkansas Code § 25-4-102(b)(4), concerning information resources, is amended to read as follows:

(4) Develop technical standards and specifications and provide technical leadership and guidance to support the state's ~~shared technical~~ enterprise architecture as promulgated by the Executive Chief Information Officer subject to the written approval of the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State.

SECTION 11. Arkansas Code § 25-4-103 is amended to read as follows:

25-4-103. Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

~~(15)~~(14) "Project management" means principles, practices, and techniques applied to lead projects and teams and the control of project schedules, costs, and performance risks with the goal of satisfying customers' requirements;

~~(17)~~(16) "State agencies" means all state departments, boards, and commissions but shall not include the elected constitutional officers and their staffs, the General Assembly and its committees and staffs, or the Supreme Court and the Administrative Office of the Courts, and public institutions of higher education with respect to academic, research, healthcare, and existing information technology applications and underlying support therefor;

(19) "Working group" means a group of subject matter experts convened for the purpose of collaborating and devising strategies.

SECTION 12. Arkansas Code § 25-4-104 is amended to read as follows:

25-4-104. Department of Information Systems.

(a) There is established within the executive department of government a

Department of Information Systems.

(b)(1) The department shall be headed by a director to be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner provided by law, and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

(2) The director shall be a person who, by education and training, has technical knowledge and management experience in information technology-related equipment, systems, and services.

(3) The director shall qualify by filing the oath of office required in the Constitution of this state with the Secretary of State.

~~(c) There is established an Office of Information Technology. The Administrator of the Office of Information Technology shall be appointed by the the Executive Chief Information Officer.~~

~~(d)~~(c) The director may establish divisions and the organizational structure deemed necessary and appropriate for the efficient performance of the duties imposed under the provisions of this chapter, provided the organizational structure of the department shall conform to the positions authorized and limitations provided therefor in the biennial appropriation of the department.

~~(e)~~(d) The director shall appoint the deputy and division directors and the professional, technical, and clerical assistants and employees as necessary to perform the duties imposed by this chapter. All employees of the department shall be employed by and serve at the pleasure of the director.

~~(f)~~(e) The director shall report to the Governor any matters relating to abuses of this chapter.

~~(g)~~(f) The director shall recommend statutory changes to the Governor.

SECTION 13. Arkansas Code § 25-4-105 is amended to read as follows:

25-4-105. Department of Information Systems - General powers and duties.

(a) The Department of Information Systems shall be vested with all the powers and duties necessary to administer the department and to enable it to carry out fully and effectively the regulations and laws relating to the department. These powers and duties relate to information technology and include, but are not limited to:

(1) Conceptualizing, designing, developing, building, and maintaining common information technology infrastructure elements used by state agencies and governmental entities;

(2) Providing information technology services to state agencies, other governmental entities, and nongovernmental first responder entities;

(3) Entering into contracts with state agencies, other governmental entities, and nongovernmental first responder entities for the purpose of providing

information technology services;

(4)(A) Establishing fair and reasonable schedules of rates or fees to be paid by customers that are provided service to enable the department to recover all allowable costs of providing the services as provided in this chapter.

(B) The same rate or fee structure will apply to all customers receiving services;

(5)(A) Establishing estimated billing rates to be developed for a two-year period to coincide with the budgeting process.

(B) The department shall have the authority to adjust billing as necessary to effect compliance with applicable state and federal statutory and regulatory provisions.

(C) Billing adjustments shall be subject to the approval of the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State and review by the Legislative Council;

(6) Acquiring information technology on behalf of state agencies, the cost of which shall be recovered through customer billings or through direct funding;

(7) Promulgating rules and regulations that are necessary for efficient administration and enforcement of the powers, functions, and duties of the department as provided in this chapter;

(8) Developing a departmental plan to support the goals and objectives set forth for it in the state information technology plans and strategies. ~~The department shall seek the advice of the Executive Chief Information Officer in the development of its plan;~~

(9) Implementing systems to ensure the security of state data and state data processing assets, to provide for disaster recovery and continuity of operations to the state agencies served, and to recover its costs from the customers benefited; ~~and~~

(10) Performing any additional powers, functions, and duties which are necessary and appropriate for the proper administration of the provisions of this chapter;

(11) Monitoring information resource security issues, coordinating all security measures which could be used to protect resources by more than one (1) governmental entity, and acting as an information technology resource to other state agencies;

(12) Assisting in the development of an information technology security policy for state agencies; and

(13) Developing the information technology security policy for state agencies;

(14) Advising agencies in acquiring information technology service;

(15) Developing the information technology standards and specifications for state agencies when requested;

(16) Participating in the development of information technology state contracts as requested by a state agency, including without limitation the identification of requirements, contract negotiation, and vendor evaluation;

(17) With respect to their technology functions and applications, all state departments, boards, commissions, and public institutions of higher education shall consult and cooperate with the Department of Information Systems in the formation and implementation of security policies for the state core information technology infrastructure; and

(18) Assisting in the development of a state information technology plan that shall establish a state-level mission, goals, and objectives for the use of information technology.

(b) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to deprive, transfer, limit, or in any way alter or change any of the powers vested in the board of trustees of any institution of higher education under existing constitutional and statutory provisions.

SECTION 14. Arkansas Code 25-4-106(a), concerning reporting requirements, is amended to read as follows:

(a)(1) The Director of the Department of Information Systems will report periodically to the Joint Committee on Advanced Communications and Information Technology and the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ regarding the status of the Department of Information Systems' information technology responsibilities in state government.

(d) Working groups shall meet at least quarterly to achieve their assigned charge.

~~(2) The administrator shall prepare the draft standards and periodic updates for the Governor and shall seek the advice of the working groups.~~

~~(3) Before the administrator submits the state standards to the Governor, he or she shall seek the advice of the steering committee and the advisory board.~~

(c)(1) Each state agency shall develop a biennial information technology plan that establishes state agency goals, objectives, and policies regarding the development and use of information technology.

(2)(A) Each state agency shall specifically include a policy regarding the use of the Internet.

(B) A statement of the agency's policy regarding the use of the Internet shall include:

(i) The penalties for violations of the agency's Internet policy;

(ii) The number of employees and computers which have access to the Internet and the percentage of those employees and computers to the total number of employees and computers;

(iii) The needs of the agency and how those needs relate to the use of the Internet; and

(iv) The responsibilities of the agency's employees as

those responsibilities relate to the efficient and responsible use of the Internet.

(3) Plans may be updated by agencies in a timely manner to remain current and must accommodate changes in the evolving state information technology plan and standards.

(d) ~~The Office of Information Technology~~ Department of Finance and Administration shall distribute criteria, elements, form, and format for agency plans. Plans may include, but not be limited to, the following:

(1) A statement of the agency's mission, goals, and objectives for information technology;

(2) Goals and objectives for achieving electronic access to agency records, information, and services;

(3) Consideration of a variety of information technologies, including those that help transcend geographic locations, standard business hours, economic conditions of users, and disabilities;

(4) Compliance with the Freedom of Information Act of 1967, § 25-19-101 et seq.;

(5) An explanation of how the state agency's mission, goals, and objectives for information technology support and conform to the state information technology plan developed by the office;

(6) An implementation strategy to include:

(A) Annual implementation objectives of the plan;

(B) Methods to educate both state employees and the public in the effective use of access technologies; and

(C) Agency activities to increase electronic access to public records and information to be implemented within available resources and existing state agency planning processes;

(7) Projects and resources required to meet the objectives of the plan;

(8) Estimated schedules and funding required to implement identified projects;

(9) An evaluation of the agency's performance relating to information technology;

(10) An assessment of progress made toward implementing the agency information technology plan;

(11) A discussion of progress toward electronic access to public information and enabling citizens to have two-way interaction for obtaining information and services from state agencies; and

(12) An inventory of state agency information technology.

(e) Plans developed or updated shall be submitted to the office Department

of Finance and Administration. The ~~office~~ Department of Finance and Administration may reject, require modification to, or approve plans as deemed appropriate. Plans shall be modified by the state agency as necessary.

(f) Plans developed or updated by public instrumentalities shall be submitted for review to the Joint Committee on Advanced Communications and Information Technology. The committee may seek the assistance of the ~~office~~ Department of Finance and Administration in conducting this review. Plans shall be modified by the public instrumentality as necessary.

SECTION 18. Arkansas Code § 25-4-111 is amended to read as follows:

25-4-111. Information technology - Prerequisites.

(a) Unless the agency first receives approval for a plan or an updated plan as provided for under § 25-4-110, no state agency shall:

(1) Acquire by purchase or lease any new or additional information technology; or

(2) Enter into any contract for information technology.

(b) If an agency desires to acquire information technology not part of an information technology plan approved under § 25-4-110, the requesting agency shall submit a waiver request to the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration that includes:

(1) Identification of necessary additional services or improvements in information technology;

(2) Relationship of the information technology improvements or additions to the overall goals of the agency;

(3) Resources needed to provide the additional services or improvements; and

(4) Measurement and evaluation criteria.

(c)(1) Upon evaluation of the waiver request, the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration shall notify the agency in writing of his or her approval or rejection of the request and his or her reasons therefor.

(2) The ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration shall make his or her evaluation in a timely manner. If the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration requires more than thirty (30) days to complete the evaluation, he or she shall report in writing to the Governor his or her reasons for the delay in completion.

(3) If the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration rejects a request for a waiver, no state

agency shall make any expenditure of public funds for the acquisition or expansion of information technology equipment or services.

(4) If the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration determines that the agency needs additional information technology resources, he or she may:

(A) Authorize the agency to acquire the requested information technology;

(B) Authorize acquisition of a modified information technology configuration;

(C) Notify the agency of the availability of department facilities to provide the requested information technology; or

(D) Recommend that the information technology be provided through the facilities of some other designated state agency.

(d) All state agencies shall comply with the provisions of the Arkansas Procurement Law, § 19-11-201 et seq., and applicable provisions of the General Accounting and Budgetary Procedures Law, § 19-4-101 et seq., in the acquisition, purchase, contracting for the purchase of, and leasing of information technology.

SECTION 19. Arkansas Code § 25-4-114(a), concerning contracts and agreements for information technology, is amended to read as follows:

(a) In the event a state agency and the Department of Information Systems are unable to resolve a dispute, the matter shall jointly be referred to the ~~Executive Chief Information Officer~~ director of the Department of Finance and Administration for resolution.

SECTION 20. Arkansas Code § 25-18-603 is amended to read as follows:

25-18-603. Definitions.

As used in this subchapter:

Any new hire for the positions as established for the implementation of the findings of the Arkansas Legislative Task Force on Abused and Neglected Children in the Office of Chief Counsel, implementation of the findings of the Arkansas Legislative Task Force on Abused and Neglected Children in the Division of Children and Family Services, and the Arkansas Options Counseling Care Program in the Division of Aging and Adult Services shall first receive prior approval of the Personnel Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council or Joint Budget Committee.

The Arkansas General Assembly has authorized additional positions for the Arkansas Options Counseling for Long-Term Care Program and to implement the findings of the Arkansas Legislative Task Force on Abused and Neglected Children Arkansas Child Safety Centers programs. After receiving prior approval of the new hire positions from the Personnel Subcommittee, the Department of Health and Human Services shall be required, as part of their request to the Personnel Subcommittee, to demonstrate that the new hire positions are allocated to the geographical areas of greatest need.

The Department of Health and Human Services shall also report quarterly to the House and Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor Committees on the activities and progress of the Arkansas Options Counseling for Long-Term Care Program and the Arkansas Legislative Task Force on Abused and Neglected Children Arkansas Child Safety Centers programs, including but not limited to, the number of positions filled, where the employees hired have been stationed, and the specific activities of the positions.

Determining the maximum number of employees and the maximum amount of appropriation and general revenue funding for a state agency each fiscal year is the prerogative of the General Assembly. This is usually accomplished by delineating such maximums in the appropriation act(s) for a state agency and the general revenue allocations authorized for each fund and fund account by amendment to the Revenue Stabilization law. Further, the General Assembly has determined that the Department of Health and Human Services may operate more efficiently if some flexibility is provided to the Department of Health and Human Services authorizing broad powers under this Section. Therefore, it is both necessary and appropriate that the General Assembly maintain oversight by requiring prior approval of the Legislative Council or Joint Budget Committee as provided by this section. The requirement of approval by the Legislative Council or Joint Budget Committee is not a severable part of this section.

If the requirement of approval by the Legislative Council or Joint Budget Committee is ruled unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, this entire section is void.

The provisions of this section shall be in effect only from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2009."
