"SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 17, Subchapter 1, is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

6-17-120. Membership in labor organization.

(a) As used in this section, "labor organization" means an entity:

(1) Organized under the laws of this state;

(2) Whose membership is composed of public school employees; and

(3) That exists for the purpose of dealing with employers concerning grievances, labor disputes, wages, rates of pay, hours of employment, or other terms and conditions of employment.

(b)(1) A public school employee may join or terminate membership in a labor organization at any time, in writing or in person.

(2) A labor organization or an employer shall not restrict the time that a public school employee may join or terminate membership in a labor organization.

(3) A labor organization shall not require a public school employee to terminate membership at more than one (1) location.

(c) A public school employee is not responsible for the payment of membership dues to a labor organization beginning seven (7) days after the public school employee terminates his or her membership in the labor organization."

Amend **HOUSE BILL NO. 1910** as originally introduced:

Page 1, line 9, delete "HIGH-PRIORITY DISTRICTS;" and substitute "CONTIGUOUS SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH HIGH DROPOUT RATES;"

AND

Delete the subtitle in its entirety and substitute:

"CONCERNING THE HIRING OF TRUANCY OFFICERS FOR CONTIGUOUS SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH HIGH DROPOUT RATES."

AND

Page 1, delete everything after the enacting clause and substitute:

"SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The General Assembly finds that:

(1) A regional community alternative learning environment center is a nonresidential school that serves students with educational limitations and deficiencies who are not currently served or are underserved by the students' resident school districts;

(2) The students served by a regional community alternative learning environment center:

(A) Come from high-priority school districts:

(i) With the most statistically significant dropout rates;

and

(ii) That because of high rates of poverty and a tax base that is continually eroded by a declining population, do not have funds for additional truancy officers to ensure the attendance of students at a regional community alternative learning environment center; and

(B) Often have a family that provides insufficient support for good school attendance; and

(3) By providing additional truancy officers for these school districts, the state helps to provide these students with the opportunity to:

(A) Be successful in school and become prepared for gainful employment or completion of a certification in a career or vocational area of study;

and

(B) Strengthen family relationships by enabling the student to reside at home.

SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 11, Subchapter 2, is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

6-11-209. Additional truancy officers.

(a) As used in this section, "school district with a high dropout rate" means an Arkansas school district that:

(1) Has the most statistically significant rate of dropouts;

(2) From which students may enroll in a regional community alternative learning environment center; and

(3) Is contiguous to other school districts that meet the criteria under subdivisions (a)(1) and (2) of this section.

(b) An education service cooperative may receive funding from a local law enforcement agency, a state agency, or a federal agency, or from private donations, to employ one (1) or more truancy officers for a school district with a high dropout rate.

(c) An education service cooperative may employ under this section:

(1) One (1) truancy officer for each school district with a high dropout rate in its service area that has a student population of one thousand (1,000) or fewer students; and

(2) Two (2) truancy officers for each school district with a high dropout rate in its service area that:

(A) Is a countywide school district; or

(B) Has a student population of more than one thousand (1,000) students.

(d) A truancy officer hired under this section shall complete:

(1) The training requirements for juvenile intake and probation officer certification through the Administrative Office of the Courts; and

(2) Twelve (12) hours of continuing education annually as approved by the judge for the juvenile division of the circuit court for the county the truancy officer serves."

(1) A regional community alternative learning environment center is a nonresidential school that serves students with educational limitations and deficiencies who are not currently served or are underserved by the students' resident school districts;

(2) The students served by a regional community alternative learning environment center come from school districts that have high rates of poverty and in which the tax base for the school districts is progressively eroded by a declining population;

(3) By providing transportation funding aid to the school districts to transport students to a regional community alternative learning environment center, the state provides these students with the opportunity to:

(A) Be successful in school and become prepared for gainful employment or completion of training and certification in a career or vocational area of study; and

(B) Strengthen family relationships by enabling the student to reside at home.

SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 11, Subchapter 2, is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

6-11-209. Transportation funding for students attending a regional community alternative learning environment center.

(a)(1) As funding is available, the Department of Education may provide transportation funding aid to school districts that transport students to a regional community alternative learning environment center that serves three (3) or more contiguous counties in which the most recent census indicates:

(A) High rates of poverty; or

(B) Declining population.

(2) The school may also receive funding for transportation under this section from other state agencies, federal agencies, or from private donations.

(b) A school district may use the state categorical funding it receives under § 6-20-2305(b)(4) to provide transportation for students who reside in the school district to attend a regional community alternative learning environment center.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO HOUSE BILL NO. 2055

Amend **HOUSE BILL NO. 2055** as originally introduced:
Page 1, line 8, delete "AN ARKANSAS SCHOOL FOR AGRICULTURE" and substitute "THE ARKANSAS SCHOOL FOR AGRICULTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES, ARTS, AND TECHNOLOGY"
AND

Delete the subtitle in its entirety and substitute:

"TO CREATE THE ARKANSAS SCHOOL FOR AGRICULTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES, ARTS, AND TECHNOLOGY."

AND

Page 1, delete everything after the enacting clause and substitute:

"SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The General Assembly finds that:

(1) Arkansas has a strong rural population that is greater than forty-three percent (43%) of the state's total population according to the 2010 census;

(2) Arkansas should value and retain its rural youth and prepare them for future agricultural and environmental careers in this state;

(3) Training and education in agricultural and environmental sciences, arts, and technology can prepare Arkansas rural youth not only for farming, animal management, and forestry careers, but also for employment that leads to a career in information technology, management, cooperatives, transportation and logistics, accounting, sales, utilities, waterways, and conservation;

(4) Arkansas already provides energy from natural gas, crude oil, nuclear electric power, and renewable energy sources such as hydropower, geothermal, solar, and wind energy;

(5) According to the University of Arkansas Division of Agriculture:

(A) Agriculture accounted for sixteen billion dollars (\$16,000,000,000) of value added to the Arkansas economy in 2010;

(B) Arkansas ranks first in the nation in the production of rice and baitfish, second in the nation in the production of broilers, and third in the nation in the production of catfish, turkeys, and cotton;

(C) Arkansas produces almost one-half (1/2) of all rice grown in the United States;

(D) Soybean production in Arkansas has a direct value-added contribution of five hundred twenty million dollars (\$520,000,000);

(E) One (1) of every six (6) jobs in Arkansas is related to agriculture;

(F) Arkansas is the first state to grow edamame commercially;

(G) The forestry sector accounted for 27,081 jobs in Arkansas in 2010; and

(H) Arkansas is considered one of the leading paper-producing states;

(6) Farmers and ranchers spend more than one hundred twenty million dollars (\$120,000,000) every year on conservation programs that help protect our natural resources;

(7) There are nearly fifty thousand (50,000) farms in Arkansas, and ninety-seven percent (97%) of those farms are family-owned;

(8) Many agricultural and environmental industries are able to form partnerships and provide support to Arkansas public school students focusing on these careers; and

(9) The state should establish a school dedicated to:

(A) Developing specialized agricultural and environmental the specialized skills and knowledge in Arkansas's public school students; and

(B) Keeping those students in Arkansas as agricultural or environmental entrepreneurs or to fill existing employment needs in and attract businesses from agricultural and environmental industries.

SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 52, is amended to add an additional subchapter to read as follows:

Subchapter 3 - Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology

6-52-301. Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology established – Location.

(a)(1) The Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology is established for the purposes under § 6-52-303 to provide one (1) or more public schools that serve students at any level of Kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12) in Arkansas.

(2)(A) The school may consist of one (1) or more campuses in the state, each of which shall be located on the campus of an Arkansas land grant university, at another Arkansas institution of higher education, or at another appropriate facility that can provide the land, equipment, classrooms, laboratories, and other facilities necessary for the proper operation and support of the school.

(B) The school shall be established in a location that:

(i) Is in close proximity to land and a water supply that are suitable for agriculture or conservation; and

(ii) Has access to fiber optic communication or other technology sufficient to support the technological needs of the school.

(C) The school may have a residential or nonresidential campus.

(b)(1) The school shall be funded by an appropriation from the General Assembly for the operation of the school and by grants, contributions, or donations received by the Department of Education for the support of the school.

(2) Students selected to attend the school shall not be required to pay tuition, fees, or, if dormitories are provided room and board.

(c) The school shall be administered by the department with the advice and counsel of the advisory board under § 6-52-302.

(d)(1) By March 1, 2014, the department shall develop a plan for the structure, operation, and funding of the school that includes equitable procedures for student recruitment and retention.

(2) The department shall publish a request for proposals to solicit proposals from institutions of higher education or other appropriate organizations or agencies for hosting the school.

(3) By July 1, 2015, the department shall select a location for the school to begin operation for the 2015-2016 school year.

(e)(1) The department shall prepare the biennial budget request for the school's operation and shall submit the request to the State Board of Education for inclusion in the biennial budget request of the department for funding programs from the Public School Fund.

(2) The department may receive contributions, donations, gifts, or other forms of financial assistance, property, land, equipment, materials, or labor from persons, foundations, trust funds, corporations, organizations and other private or public sources to be expended for the operation of the school.

6-52-302. Advisory board.

(a) A seven-member advisory board for the Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology is established for the general purpose of providing support and advice concerning the operation of the school.

(b)(1) The advisory board consists of:

(A) The following members appointed by the Commissioner of Education:

(i) One (1) person who holds an administrator's license issued by the State Board of Education and has taught or served as an administrator in a school in an agricultural community;

(ii) Three (3) persons, each of whom represents a different sector of the agriculture industry;

(iii) One (1) person who holds a teaching license issued by the state board in an agriculture content area; and

(iv) One (1) person appointed by the President of the Arkansas Science and Technology Authority; and

(B) One (1) member of the Governor's Workforce Cabinet or, if the cabinet does not exist, one (1) member appointed by the Governor.

(2) A member of the board shall not be an employee of the school.

(3) Appointees shall serve a term of three (3) years, as follows:

(A) Two (2) of the initial appointees shall be appointed for a term of one year;

(B) Two (2) of the initial appointees shall be appointed for a term of two years; and

(C) Three (3) of the initial appointees shall be appointed for a term of three years;

(D) Subsequent appointments to the board shall be for three-year terms.

(4) A member of the board shall not serve more than nine (9) years.

(5) The board annually shall elect a chair and other officers as the board deems appropriate.

(c) The duties of the advisory board are to:

(1) Recommend implementation and establishment of policies;

(2) Serve as a liaison between the school, parents, and other constituents;

(3) Provide meaningful advice and recommendations to further the development and operation of the school;

(4) Assist in securing financial support for the school;

(5) Advise the superintendent of the school and the commissioner regarding the educational, service, and financial needs of the school;

(6) Accept and execute specific assignments made by the commissioner or the state board;

(7) Keep informed on matters necessary to promote the educational aims of the school for the benefit of the students;

(8) Study in detail the reports and issues placed before it by the superintendent, commissioner, or state board; and

(9) Promote in diverse ways the growth and development in excellence of the school.

(d) The advisory board shall have oversight concerning the school's operating budget, internal governance, and methods of operations.

6-52-303. Purpose.

(a) The purposes of the Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology are to:

(1) Attract students who intend to remain in or return to agricultural areas and who possess the aptitude to provide critical services necessary to the success of Arkansas's agricultural communities;

(2) Prepare students for occupations or postsecondary education related to:

(A) Agriculture;

(B) Agriscience;

(C) Agribusiness;

(D) Agritourism;

(E) The care and management of animals;

(F) Aquaculture;

(G) Forestry;

(H) Horticulture; and

(l) Other environmental sciences, including without limitation wind, water, tree, plant, and soil science, technology, and conservation;

(3) Form partnerships with agricultural and environmental industries and organizations that:

(A) Support the school with one (1) or more of the following:

(i) Funding;

(ii) Land;

(iii) Instructional assistance or expertise;

(iv) Technology, materials, and equipment; and

(v) Internships, mentoring, or other career-related opportunities for the students;

(4) Provide flexible opportunities for learning, which may include without limitation:

(A) Project-based learning to provide students:

(i) The opportunity to apply skills and knowledge to real problems; and

(ii) Be exposed to feedback and evaluation from industry professionals;

(B) Internships and on-the-job learning opportunities; and

(C) Online and hybrid classroom teaching;

(5) Develop curriculum and materials to improve instruction in agricultural and environmental sciences, arts, and technology to improve instruction in science and technology to other public schools in the state.

(c) To reduce the duplication of services while maximizing student learning and acquisition of skills, the school also may offer:

(1) Vocational-technical education in conjunction with other public schools; and

(2) Concurrent credit and other programs in conjunction with institutions of higher education.

6-52-304. Superintendent.

(a) The Department of Education shall employ a superintendent for the Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology who shall serve at the pleasure of the Commissioner of Education.

(b) The superintendent shall be the chief administrative officer of the school and administer the school according to the policies established by the department.

(c) The superintendent shall employ other personnel as he or she deems necessary for the operation of the school.

(d) The superintendent and other personnel employed for the operation of the school:

- (1) Are employees of the State of Arkansas; and
- (2) Earn credited service and are eligible for membership in the Arkansas Teacher Retirement System or the Arkansas Public Employees' Retirement System.

6-52-305. State Board of Education regulations.

(a) The State Board of Education may promulgate rules to implement this subchapter.

(b) All state board rules shall apply to the Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology but the Commissioner of Education may waive or modify a rule to provide the flexibility needed to accomplish the purposes and intent of this subchapter.

6-52-306. State agency technical assistance.

(a) The following state agencies shall provide technical assistance to the staff of the school:

- (1) Department of Education;
- (2) Department of Higher Education;
- (3) Arkansas Agriculture Department;
- (4) Department of Parks and Tourism;
- (5) Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality;
- (6) Arkansas Science and Technology Authority; and
- (7) Arkansas Economic Development Commission.

(b) The Department of Education may contract with other agencies or private research centers to carry out its responsibilities for the operation of the school.

6-52-307. Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology Fund.

(a) There is created on the books of the Treasurer of State, the Auditor of State, and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State a fund to be known as the "Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology Fund".

(b) The fund shall be used to provide for the maintenance, operation, and improvement required by the Arkansas School for Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts, and Technology in carrying out its powers, functions, and duties as set out by law.

SECTION 21. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. HEALTH CARE INDEPENDENCE ACT OF 2013. Arkansas Code Title 20, Chapter 77, is amended to create a new subchapter to read as follows:

Subchapter 21 — Health Care Independence Act of 2013

20-77-2101. Title.

This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Health Care Independence Act of 2013".

20-77-2102. Legislative intent.

(a) Notwithstanding any general or specific laws to the contrary, the Department of Human Services is to explore design options that reform the Medicaid Program utilizing the Health Care Independence Act of 2013 so that it is a fiscally sustainable, cost-effective, personally responsible, and opportunity-driven program utilizing competitive and value-based purchasing to:

- (1) Maximize the available service options;
- (2) Promote accountability, personal responsibility, and transparency;
- (3) Encourage and reward healthy outcomes and responsible choices;

and

- (4) Promote efficiencies that will deliver value to the taxpayers.

(b)(1) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the State of Arkansas through the Department of Human Services shall utilize a private insurance option for "low-risk" adults.

- (2) The Health Care Independence Act of 2013 shall ensure that:

(A) Private health care options increase and government-operated programs such as Medicaid decrease; and

(B) Decisions about the design, operation and implementation of this option, including cost, remain within the purview of the State of Arkansas and not with Washington, D.C.

20-77-2103. Purpose.

- (a) The purpose of this subchapter is to:

- (1) Improve access to quality health care;

(2) Attract insurance carriers and enhance competition in the Arkansas insurance marketplace;

(3) Promote individually-owned health insurance;

(4) Strengthen personal responsibility through cost-sharing;

(5) Improve continuity of coverage;

(6) Reduce the size of the state-administered Medicaid program;

(7) Encourage appropriate care, including early intervention, prevention, and wellness;

(8) Increase quality and delivery system efficiencies;

(9) Facilitate Arkansas's continued payment innovation, delivery system reform, and market-driven improvements;

(10) Discourage over-utilization; and

(11) Reduce waste, fraud, and abuse.

(b) The State of Arkansas shall take an integrated and market-based approach to covering low-income Arkansans through offering new coverage opportunities, stimulating market competition, and offering alternatives to the existing Medicaid program.

20-77-2104. Definitions.

As used in this subchapter:

(1) "Carrier" means a private entity certified by the State Insurance Department and offering plans through the Health Insurance Marketplace;

(2) "Cost sharing" means the portion of the cost of a covered medical service that must be paid by or on behalf of eligible individuals, consisting of copayments or coinsurance but not deductibles;

(3) "Eligible individuals" means individuals who:

(A) Are adults between nineteen (19) years of age and sixty-five (65) years of age with an income that is equal to or less than one hundred thirty-eight percent (138%) of the federal poverty level, including without limitation individuals who would not be eligible for Medicaid under laws and rules in effect on January 1, 2013;

(B) Have been authenticated to be a United States citizen or documented qualified alien according to the federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, Pub. L. No. 104-193, as existing on January 1, 2013; and

(C) Are not determined to be more effectively covered through the standard Medicaid program, such as an individual who is medically frail or other individuals with exceptional medical needs for whom coverage through the Health

Insurance Marketplace is determined to be impractical, overly complex, or would undermine continuity or effectiveness of care;

(4) "Healthcare coverage" means healthcare benefits as defined by certification or rules, or both, promulgated by the State Insurance Department for the Qualified Health Plans or available on the marketplace;

(5) "Health Insurance Marketplace" means the vehicle created to help individuals, families, and small businesses in Arkansas shop for and select health insurance coverage in a way that permits comparison of available Qualified Health Plan based upon price, benefits, services, and quality, regardless of the governance structure of the marketplace;

(6) "Premium" means a charge that must be paid as a condition of enrolling in health care coverage;

(7) "Program" means the Health Care Independence Program established by this subchapter; and

(8) "Qualified Health Plan" means a State Insurance Department certified individual health insurance plan offered by a carrier through the Health Insurance Marketplace.

20-77-2105. Administration of the Health Care Independence Program.

(a) The Department of Human Services shall:

(1) Create and administer the Health Care Independence Program;

and

(2) Submit Medicaid State Plan Amendments and apply for any federal waivers necessary to implement the program in a manner consistent with this subchapter.

(b)(1) Implementation of the program is conditioned upon the receipt of necessary federal approvals.

(2) If the Department of Human Services does not receive the necessary federal approvals, the program shall not be implemented.

(c) The program shall include premium assistance for eligible individuals to enable their enrollment in a Qualified Health Plan through the Health Insurance Marketplace.

(d)(1) The Department of Human Services is specifically authorized to pay premiums and supplemental cost-sharing subsidies directly to the Qualified Health Plans for enrolled eligible individuals.

(2) The intent of the payments under subdivision (d)(1) of this section is to increase participation and competition in the health insurance market, intensify price pressures, and reduce costs for both publicly and privately funded health care.

(e) To the extent allowable by law:

(1) The Department of Human Services shall pursue strategies that promote insurance coverage of children in their parents' or caregivers' plan, including children eligible for the ARKids First Program Act, § 20-77-1101 et seq., commonly known as the "ARKids B program"; and

(2) Upon the receipt of necessary federal approval, during calendar year 2015 the Department of Human Services shall include and transition to the Health Insurance Marketplace:

(A) Children eligible for the ARKids First Program Act, § 20-77-1101 et seq.; and

(B) Populations under Medicaid from zero percent (0%) of the federal poverty level to seventeen percent (17%) of the federal poverty level.

(3) The Department of Human Services shall develop and implement a strategy to inform Medicaid recipient populations whose needs would be reduced or better served through participation in the Health Insurance Marketplace.

(f) The program shall include allowable cost sharing for eligible individuals that is comparable to that for individuals in the same income range in the private insurance market and is structured to enhance eligible individuals' investment in their health care purchasing decisions.

(g)(1) The State Insurance Department and Department of Human Services shall administer and promulgate rules to administer the program authorized under this subchapter.

(2) No less than thirty (30) days before the State Insurance Department and Department of Human Services begin promulgating a rule under this subchapter, the proposed rule shall be presented to the Legislative Council.

(h) The program authorized under this subchapter shall terminate within one hundred twenty (120) days after a reduction in any of the following federal medical assistance percentages:

(1) One hundred percent (100%) in 2014, 2015,
or 2016;

(2) Ninety-five percent (95%) in 2017;

(3) Ninety-four percent (94%) in 2018;

(4) Ninety-three percent (93%) in 2019; and

(5) Ninety percent (90%) in 2020 or any year after 2020.

(i) An eligible individual enrolled in the program shall affirmatively acknowledge that:

(1) The program is not a perpetual federal or state right or a guaranteed entitlement;

(2) The program is subject to cancellation upon appropriate notice;
and

(3) The program is not an entitlement program.

(j)(1) The Department of Human Services shall develop a model and seek approval from the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services to allow a limited number of enrollees to participate in a pilot program testing the viability of a Health Savings Account or a Medical Savings Account.

(2) The pilot program shall be implemented during calendar year 2015.

(3) As soon as practicable, the Department of Human Services shall seek conditional federal approval to place Health Saving Accounts and Medical Savings Accounts on the Health Insurance Marketplace.

(k)(1) State obligations for uncompensated care shall be projected, tracked, and reported to identify potential incremental future decreases.

(2) The Department of Human Services shall recommend appropriate adjustments to the General Assembly.

(3) Adjustments shall be made by the General Assembly as appropriate.

(l) The Department of Human Services shall track the Hospital Assessment Fee as defined in § 20-77-1902 and report to the General Assembly subsequent decreases based upon reduced uncompensated care.

(m) On a quarterly basis, the Department of Human Services and the State Insurance Department shall report to the Legislative Council or to the Joint Budget Committee if the General Assembly is in session, available information regarding:

(1) Program enrollment;

(2) Patient experience;

(3) Economic impact including enrollment distribution;

(4) Carrier competition; and

(5) Avoided uncompensated care.

20-77-2106. Standards of healthcare coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace.

(a) Healthcare coverage shall be achieved through a qualified health plan at the silver level as provided in 42 U.S.C. §§ 18022 and 18071, as existing on January 1, 2013, that restricts cost sharing to amounts that do not exceed Medicaid cost-sharing limitations.

(b) All participating carriers in the Health Insurance Marketplace shall offer healthcare coverage conforming to the requirements of this subchapter.

(c) To assure price competitive choice among healthcare coverage options, the State Insurance Department shall assure that at least two (2) qualified health plans are offered in each county in the state.

(d) Health insurance carriers offering health care coverage for program eligible individuals shall participate in Arkansas Payment Improvement Initiatives including:

- (1) Assignment of primary care clinician;
- (2) Support for patient-centered medical home; and
- (3) Access of clinical performance data for providers.

(e) On or before July 1, 2013, the State Insurance Department shall implement through certification requirements, rule, or both the applicable provisions of this subchapter.

20-77-2107. Enrollment.

(a) The General Assembly shall assure that a mechanism within the Health Insurance Marketplace is established and operated to facilitate enrollment of eligible individuals.

(b) The enrollment mechanism shall include an automatic verification system to guard against waste, fraud, and abuse in the program.

20-77-2108. Effective date.

This subchapter shall be in effect until June 30, 2017, unless amended or extended by the General Assembly.

SECTION 22. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. Arkansas Code Title 19, Chapter 5, Subchapter 11, is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

19-5-1140. Health Care Independence Program Trust Fund.

(a) There is created on the books of the Treasurer of State, the Auditor of State, and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State a trust fund to be known as the "Health Care Independence Program Trust Fund".

(b)(1) The Health Care Independence Program Trust Fund may consist of moneys saved and accrued under the Health Care Independence Act of 2013, § 20-77-2101 et seq., including without limitation:

- (A) Increases in premium tax collections;
- (B) Reductions in uncompensated care; and
- (C) Other spending reductions resulting from the Health Care Independence Act of 2013, § 20-77-2101 et seq.

(2) The fund shall also consist of other revenues and funds authorized by law.

(c) The fund may be used by the Department of Human Services to pay for future obligations under the Health Care Independence Program created by the Health Care Independence Act of 2013, § 20-77-2101 et seq.

SECTION 23. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. DO NOT CODIFY. (a) The implementation of Sections 18 and 19 of this act is suspended until an appropriation for implementation is passed by a three-fourths vote of both houses of the Eighty-Ninth General Assembly.

(b) If an appropriation for implementation is not passed by the Eighty-Ninth General Assembly, Sections 18 and 19 of this act are void."

(a) It is found and determined by the General Assembly, that the Constitution of the State of Arkansas prohibits the appropriation of funds for more than a one (1) year period; that the effectiveness of this Act on July 1, 2013, is essential to the operation of the agency for which the appropriations in this Act are provided, and that in the event of an extension of the legislative session, the delay in the effective date of this Act beyond July 1, 2013, could work irreparable harm upon the proper administration and provision of essential governmental programs. Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and Sections 1-20 and 24-25 of this Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2013.

(b) It is found and determined by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the Health Care Independence Program requires private insurance companies to create, present to the Department of Human Services for approval, implement, and market a new kind of insurance policy; and that the private insurance companies need certainty about the law creating the Health Care Independence Program before fully investing time, funds, personnel, and other resources to the development of the new insurance policies. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and Sections 21-23 of this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall become effective on:

(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;

(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor, the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the bill; or

(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto."
