For An Act To Be Entitled

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE AND EXPEDITE NECESSARY
IMPROVEMENTS TO THE LITTLE ROCK NINE MEMORIAL ON THE
STATE CAPITOL GROUNDS; TO GRANT AUTHORITY THE
SECRETARY OF STATE TO CORRECT A TYPOGRAPHICAL ERROR
ON A PLAQUE ACCOMPANYING THE LITTLE ROCK NINE
MEMORIAL; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Subtitle

TO AUTHORIZE AND EXPEDITE NECESSARY
IMPROVEMENTS TO THE LITTLE ROCK NINE
MEMORIAL ON THE STATE CAPITOL GROUNDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The General Assembly finds that:

(a) The Little Rock Nine memorial on the State Capitol grounds bears a plaque that states:

“TESTAMENT”

(2) The sentence that reads “It was, in part, this focus that allowed them to suffer the indignities heaped upon them by those who firmly believed in the laws of equality.” should read as follows:

SECTION 2. DO NOT CODIFY. Temporary Language.

(a)(1) The Secretary of State shall replace, reconstruct, or revise the plaque to read as follows:

(2) The Secretary of State shall revise the phrase that currently reads “the indignities heaped upon them by those who firmly believed in the laws of equality.” to read “the indignities heaped upon them by those who firmly believed in the laws of inequality.”

(b) The Secretary of State shall:

(1) Make any improvements necessary to make the language edit required under this act;

(2) Enter into contracts and agreements necessary to effectuate the requirements of this act; and

(3) Solicit funds in furtherance the purposes of this act.

(c)(1) The Secretary of State shall approve the design and materials used in furtherance of this section.

(2) However, the design and materials shall be as similar to the design and materials used in the remainder of the memorial as necessary to effectuate a seamless design that is as close to the original as possible.

(d) The Capitol Arts and Grounds Commission shall assist the Secretary of State to facilitate the process upon request by the Secretary of State.
