HOUSE RESOLUTION

TO EXTEND THE SECOND EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CONSIDER A BILL BY SENATOR GARNER TO PROHIBIT THE PROPAGATION OF DIVISIVE CONCEPTS IN CERTAIN PUBLIC ENTITIES, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES, TO PROVIDE FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATING THE LAW CONCERNING THE PROPAGATION OF DIVISIVE CONCEPTS, AND TO ALLOW THE ARKANSAS STATE CLAIMS COMMISSION TO HAVE JURISDICTION OVER CLAIMS OF VIOLATIONS OF THE LAW PROHIBITING THE PROPAGATION OF DIVISIVE CONCEPTS.

TO EXTEND THE SECOND EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CONSIDER A BILL BY SENATOR GARNER TO PROHIBIT THE PROPAGATION OF DIVISIVE CONCEPTS.

WHEREAS, Arkansas Constitution, Article 6, § 19, provides that, after the General Assembly has disposed of the business set forth in the Governor's proclamation to convene an extraordinary session, the General Assembly may, by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of all the members elected to both houses, remain in session for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) days for the purpose of transacting other legislative business; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly has disposed of the matters set forth in



the Governor's proclamation calling the Second Extraordinary Session of the Ninety-Third General Assembly,

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

THAT the Second Extraordinary Session of the Ninety-Third General Assembly has completed action deemed to be necessary with respect to the business set forth in the Governor's proclamation to convene the extraordinary session.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Second Extraordinary Session of the Ninety-Third General Assembly is extended in accordance with Arkansas Constitution, Article 6, § 19, and shall remain in session for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) days for the purpose of considering a bill by Senator Garner to prohibit the propagation of divisive concepts in certain public entities, including without limitation public schools and education service cooperatives, to provide for a penalty for violating the law concerning the propagation of divisive concepts, and to allow the Arkansas State Claims Commission to have jurisdiction over claims of violations of the law prohibiting the propagation of divisive concepts.
