SENATE RESOLUTION

TO ENCOURAGE THE STATE OF ARKANSAS TO REFRAIN FROM
CONTRACTING WITH COMPANIES OR ENTITIES THAT BENEFIT
FROM UYGHUR FORCED LABOR.

TO ENCOURAGE THE STATE OF ARKANSAS TO
REFRAIN FROM CONTRACTING WITH COMPANIES
OR ENTITIES THAT BENEFIT FROM UYGHUR
FORCED LABOR.

WHEREAS, there is currently a genocide occurring in Xinjiang, China that is documented through investigations, including credible investigative journalism outlets, Congressional Findings, formal reports issued by the United States Department of State, the United States Department of Homeland Security, and other agencies; and

WHEREAS, outside the internment camps and prisons, the Xinjiang government is implementing an apartheid-like system of persecution of ordinary people, including forced sterilization, forced birth control, forced abortion, forced marriage, forced labor, and other atrocity crimes; and

WHEREAS, these camps target citizens on the basis of their religious and ethnic identity, especially Uyghurs, Kazakhs, and Kyrgyz, and other Turkic majority-Muslim peoples; and

WHEREAS, within the camps, detainees are required to memorize Communist propaganda, repeat the anthems of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP), and are forbidden from expressing any form of their religion including, but not



limited to: praying, abstaining from forbidden foods, owning religious books, having a beard, or wearing the hijab; and

WHEREAS, Uyghurs under China's 24-7 surveillance systems are unable to speak publicly without risking immediate detention and international observers must provide a voice for the voiceless by ensuring by law that international business operations do not lend support and assistance to the atrocity crimes detailed above; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of State, United States Department of the Treasury, United States Department of Commerce, United States Department of Labor, and United States Department of Homeland Security have condemned the Chinese government's repression of Uyghurs, and have twice, in July 2020 and July 2021, warned American businesses that there is a "high risk" of complicity, and of violating United States laws, unless they conduct a detailed analysis of their global supply chains; and

WHEREAS, in February of 2022, the United States led a diplomatic boycott of the Winter Olympics held in Beijing, China, because of the human rights abuses of the country; and

WHEREAS, former Under Secretary of State for Economic Growth, Energy, and the Environment, Keith Krach issued a letter confirming that the People's Republic of China is committing some of the most serious acts involving mass human rights abuses since World War II and stated that "corporate responsibility is social responsibility" and that companies should feel obligated to dissociate themselves from the atrocities occurring in China; and

WHEREAS, in June of 2021, the Uyghur genocide was condemned by the Southern Baptist National Convention; and

WHEREAS, many industries have been documented as linked to forced labor in the region, many of which have been identified under the Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act as high-risk products, including cotton, tomatoes, construction materials, automotive inputs, and polysilicon; and

WHEREAS, this is a cause that many Arkansans support throughout the state, as seen through the widespread support of the youth-led End the Uyghur Genocide project,

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

THAT the Senate encourage the State of Arkansas to refrain from contracting with companies or entities that benefit from Uyghur forced labor.
